

WHEREAS: Colorectal cancer is the leading cause of cancer death for men, and second leading cause of cancer death for women under the age of 50; and

WHEREAS: colorectal cancer is one of the few cancers that can be prevented with timely screening, but 1 in 3 eligible Americans are not up to date on screening; and

WHEREAS: American Indian, Alaska Natives and Black Americans are more likely to be diagnosed with colorectal cancer and more likely to die from the disease than other groups; and

WHEREAS: colorectal cancer is expected to account for 12% of cancer deaths among Hispanic men and 9% of cancer deaths for Hispanic women; and

WHEREAS: Americans in rural areas are more likely to be diagnosed with and die from colorectal cancer than Americans in urban areas; and

WHEREAS: in 2024 there were approximately 152,810 new cases and 53,010 deaths from colorectal cancer; and

WHEREAS: the national goal established by the National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable is to strive to increase timely colorectal cancer screening rates to 80 percent in every community for all Americans eligible for screening; and

WHEREAS: observing a Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month during the month of March would provide a special opportunity to increase awareness and offer education on the importance of early detection and screening of colorectal cancer.

NOW, THEREFORE: I, Rex Hardin, Mayor of the City of Pompano Beach, FL, on behalf of the City Commission do hereby proclaim March 2025 as COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH and encourage all citizens of Pompano Beach to take part in activities which will raise awareness about the symptoms and diagnostic tools available for this disease.
