

INCIDENT SUMMARY REPORT

Pompano Beach North West — Northwest Corridor, Pompano Beach, FL 33060
Reporting Period: April 1 – 30, 2026

Overview

This report compiles all incident and patrol activity logged by FPI Security Services officers at the Pompano Beach North West corridor during the month of April 2026. A total of approximately 140+ reports were filed by the patrol team, covering foot patrols, actionable incidents, parking enforcement checks, weather interruptions, and property-specific activity. The corridor encompasses Old Town Pompano, the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. church area, Fountain Square Park, the South Bar & Kitchen / Vault entertainment district (165 NE 1st Ave / 61 NE 1st St), and surrounding residential and commercial areas along N Flagler Ave and NW 10th Ave.

Routine Foot Patrols

Foot patrol coverage spanned the full North West corridor. Key locations regularly patrolled included:

- Old Town Pompano Beach (general corridor — Officers Jean, Burns, Hanes)
- South Bar & Kitchen — 165 NE 1st Ave (multiple daily checks)

- The Vault — 61 NE 1st St (evening/overnight checks)
- 509 NW 6th Ave (perimeter patrol — Officers Burns & Supervisor Ilamise)
- Fountain Square Park — 42 NE 1st St / 124 N Flagler Ave
- Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. church area — 335, 353, 713 MLK Blvd
- 445 NW 2nd Ave / 467 NW 2nd Ave (Sub Station area)
- N Flagler Ave corridor — 114, 200, 202, 204, 208, 216 N Flagler Ave
- NE 1st Ave / NE 1st St — 101, 131, 201 NE 1st Ave
- 212 NW 10th Ave (Big Field — Officer Vega, daily patrols)
- Annie Gillis Park — NW 9th Ave
- Bojo Restaurant / NE 1st St (Officer Vega, daily dumping checks)

Officer Joshua Isaac conducted regular overnight walk-throughs of the entertainment district (South Bar, Vault, surrounding businesses) at 165 NE 1st Ave, typically between 9 PM and 11 PM. Officer Thompson performed systematic nightly parking enforcement at 60 NE 1st St, 201 NE 1st Ave, and 370 N Flagler Ave. Officer Vega patrolled 212 NW 10th Ave daily, documenting conditions at the illegal dumping site and the surrounding field.

Trespassing Incidents

Trespassing was the most frequent actionable incident type, with approximately 35 documented incidents. The primary subjects involved transient/homeless individuals sleeping at church properties, storefronts, parks, and public areas. In all cases except one (April 14 — BSO called), individuals voluntarily complied when verbally warned by officers.

Notable pattern: The 713 Dr. MLK Jr. Blvd. church property and the N Flagler Ave corridor (200–216) were the highest-concentration trespassing locations, together accounting for approximately 55% of all trespassing incidents. The April 14 incident at the construction site (210 NE 2nd St) was the only case requiring police (BSO) involvement — the subject had established an encampment and left belongings behind after removal.

Loitering Incidents

Approximately 14 loitering incidents were documented during the month. Key incidents include:

- Apr 2 — Officer Vega dispersed 3 individuals loitering at Ali Cultural Arts, 353 Dr. MLK Blvd. Supervisor McDowell notified.
- Apr 4 — Officer Jean observed a group loitering at 101 NE 1st Ave; group dispersed. Supervisor McDowell notified.
- Apr 5 — Officer Isaac dispersed a group loitering at 124 N Flagler Ave (Fountain Park) at 6:00 AM.
- Apr 6 — Officer Isaac dispersed a woman sleeping/loitering at 61 NE 1st St (the Vault area).
- Apr 7 — Officer Isaac dispersed a group loitering in front of 33 NE 1st St at 9:00 PM.
- Apr 8 — Officer Jean observed loitering at 467 NW 2nd Ave and 335 MLK Blvd; both dispersed.
- Apr 11 — Officer Jean observed a female loitering at 501 MLK Blvd (Annie Gillis Park). Supervisor McDowell & EMT notified.
- Apr 12 — Officer Jean dispersed a male loitering at 467 NW 2nd Ave.
- Apr 16 — Officer Jean dispersed two females and one male loitering at 464 NW 2nd Ave.
- Apr 17 — Officer Jean dispersed individuals loitering at 501 MLK Blvd and a woman sleeping at 101 NE 1st St. Supervisor McDowell notified.
- Apr 18 — Officer Jean dispersed a female loitering at 61 NE 1st St.
- Apr 19 — Officer Jean dispersed a group at 353 MLK Blvd. Supervisor McDowell notified. Officer Vega dispersed a sleeping woman at 731 MLK Jr. Blvd.
- Apr 19 — (The Hive) Officer Jean observed loitering at 353 MLK Blvd. Supervisor McDowell notified.
- Apr 27 — Officer Isaac dispersed two men loitering at 114 N Flagler Ave.

Parking Enforcement

Officer Darrien Thompson conducted systematic nightly parking enforcement checks at three designated locations throughout the month. Checks were performed at approximately 1:00 AM–2:00 AM each night:

- 60 NE 1st St — checked nightly; no violations reported on most nights
- 201 NE 1st Ave — checked nightly; one overnight violation noted (Apr 4: white Ford plate #E97-F42; Apr 5: white Ford plate #BUS1W; Apr 19: white Ford #BUS1W; Apr 26: silver Nissan #RPV-A39)
- 370 N Flagler Ave — checked nightly; no violations reported

The same white Ford (plate #BUS1W) was noted parked overnight at 201 NE 1st Ave on multiple occasions (April 5 and 19). Officer Thompson also conducted routine 2:00 AM walk-throughs of the South Bar area on active nights, logging all-clear status.

Illegal Dumping Observations

Officer Vega documented ongoing illegal dumping activity at 212 NW 10th Ave (Big Field) throughout the month. Dumping incidents were also observed on NW 1st St. This is a persistent issue reported on virtually every patrol visit to the location. Specific dumping report dates:

- April 2, 3, 4, 5 — Illegal dumping site noted with trash at 212 NW 10th Ave
- April 8, 9 — Continued trash accumulation documented
- April 15 — Officer Thompson additionally documented leftover items from homeless encampment at 210 NE 2nd St
- April 16, 23, 24 — Continued illegal dumping on NW 10th Ave and NW 1st St

Disturbance Incident

- **April 12** — Officer Jean received a call from the manager of South Bar & Kitchen (165 NE 1st Ave) reporting that an intoxicated individual ran into the restaurant claiming someone was trying to harm him. Officer Jean responded and calmly directed the individual to leave. The individual complied after brief hesitation. No police were called; the situation was resolved without escalation. Supervisor McDowell (ID 4827) was notified.

Weather-Related Patrol Interruptions

Three weather-related patrol interruptions were documented during the month:

- April 2 — Officers Jean and Supervisor Ilamise unable to complete routine scan due to weather (AM).
- April 6 — Officer Thompson unable to scan checkpoints due to weather (~5:00 AM).
- April 7 — Officers Burns and Supervisor Ilamise unable to complete scan due to heavy rain (AM).
- April 8 — Officer Thompson unable to scan checkpoints due to weather (~2:00 AM).
- April 23 — Officer Hanes unable to conduct scan due to weather (~9:07 AM).
- April 26 — Officer Vega unable to complete checkpoints due to rain (PM); monitoring continued.

Key Findings & Observations

- Trespassing by transient/homeless individuals is the dominant recurring security concern in the NW corridor, concentrated at the MLK Blvd. church properties and the N Flagler Ave commercial corridor.
- The 713 Dr. MLK Jr. Blvd. church property required attention on virtually every patrol day, with multiple trespassing incidents recorded across the month.
- The April 14 construction site encampment at 210 NE 2nd St was the only incident requiring BSO (police) involvement during the reporting period.
- All other incidents were resolved without escalation, arrests, or use of force. Verbal compliance rate: ~98%.
- Illegal dumping at 212 NW 10th Ave is a persistent environmental concern documented on nearly every patrol visit. This issue may warrant escalation to code enforcement or city services.
- The same vehicle (white Ford, plate #BUS1W) was repeatedly observed parked overnight at 201 NE 1st Ave — this vehicle should be monitored and may warrant a warning notice.
- The South Bar & Kitchen / Vault entertainment district required consistent overnight foot patrol coverage, with Officer Isaac logging multiple walk-throughs per night.
- The April 12 disturbance at South Bar was handled professionally with no police required — community relations with the establishment remain positive.
- No vandalism, assaults, or arrests were recorded during the reporting period.
- Officer coverage in the NW corridor involved a larger team than the East corridor, reflecting the broader geographic footprint and higher volume of incidents.
